## C.A.R. Voc.

Petition - a written request to a person in authority

Tax (levy) - money used to the government

Boycott - to refuse to buy something

Protest - a statement or action to what someone said

Repeal - to do away with

Colonists - Am. Settlers

Imposed - force to accept

English Parliament - members that make laws for the king

Act - a law

Quartering - housing soldiers to live in

Tyrant - ruler of power

Free Enterprise - your own business with little govt (laws)

Consent - Permission to do something

## C.A.R. VOC. A.C

Writ (of assistance) - written command by law

Dockworkers - Person that works with boats and supplies

Customs House - Place at a port where incoming goods are checked

Propaganda - mislead information to promote a cause

Massacre - Brutal killing of many people

Rule of law - law that everyone must follow



<b>Parliament</b>	Representatives who help the King make laws and decisions
<b>Patrick Henry</b> <del>Give</del> Liberty or Give me Death!" <del>It's</del> be treason, make the most of it!"	Virginia Governor and orator that was against British taxes
<b>King George III</b>	British King of England
<b>Loyalists</b> →	Remain loyal to the King
<b>Patriot</b> →	Wanted Independence
<b>Neutralists</b> →	Did not support either side
<b>Redcoats</b> (Lobsterbacks)	British soldiers that wore red uniforms
<b>Crispus Attucks</b>	Freeman soldier that got shot at Boston Massacre
<b>John Adams</b>	Boston lawyer that defended the Redcoats - believed in the rule of law
